• This is a survey course at the beginning level, which discusses stars, stellar systems, galaxies, and the universe as a whole. Topics will include stellar evolution, formation of galaxies, and cosmology. A minimum of mathematics is required. Recommended for non-science majors. 3 credits.

## Exams, tests & scores:

- There will be three tests: Feb. 17, March 15, and April 21. Each test lasts for 1 hour and there are 50 pts for each test. No make up tests will be made, but the lowest score in the three tests will be dropped. You can earn a maximum of 100 pts from these tests.
- The final exam will be on Monday, May. 3-rd at 1:00 pm. It will last 1 and 1/2 hours. The maximum score will be 75 pts.
- There will be 25 pts assigned for attendance. Attendance will be checked randomly 5 times during the semester, and each time the attendants will get 5 pts.
- The maximum score for the class will be 200 pts.
- Final letter grades will be assigned based on the total numerical score (= score from two tests+ final+ attendance points).
